General Update



- Restructuring of the Accent Leadership Team – temporary housing management cover arrangements in place: Shaun Finnegan, Jonathan Place
- Recruitment process underway
- New Director of Property Services – Edith Shah
- Recruitment of technical posts remains challenging

New Contract Arrangements



- Axis contract ended 30th May 2022
- Ian Williams awarded contract wef 30th May 2022
- Senior Contracts Manager, David Guy, in place to deal with demobilisation and mobilisation
- In transition period – working through end position with Axis ie. open repair orders, financial completions etc
- Open outstanding orders at end of contract approximately 1500



Repairs Update



- Ian Williams dealing directly with most trades now
- All new repairs jobs being scheduled in line with published timescales ie. Emergency & routine
- Using some sub-contractors to help with non-urgent backlog of repairs – groundworks, plastering and some electrical works
- Targeted customer communications in progress
- Community events planned for the summer – build trust and confidence
- Will take six months to resolve all of the backlog
- Planned works in progress – windows, fire doors, kitchens, bathrooms & external decorations
- Customer engagement events held re decarbonisation programme – design work underway – work to be completed by March 2023

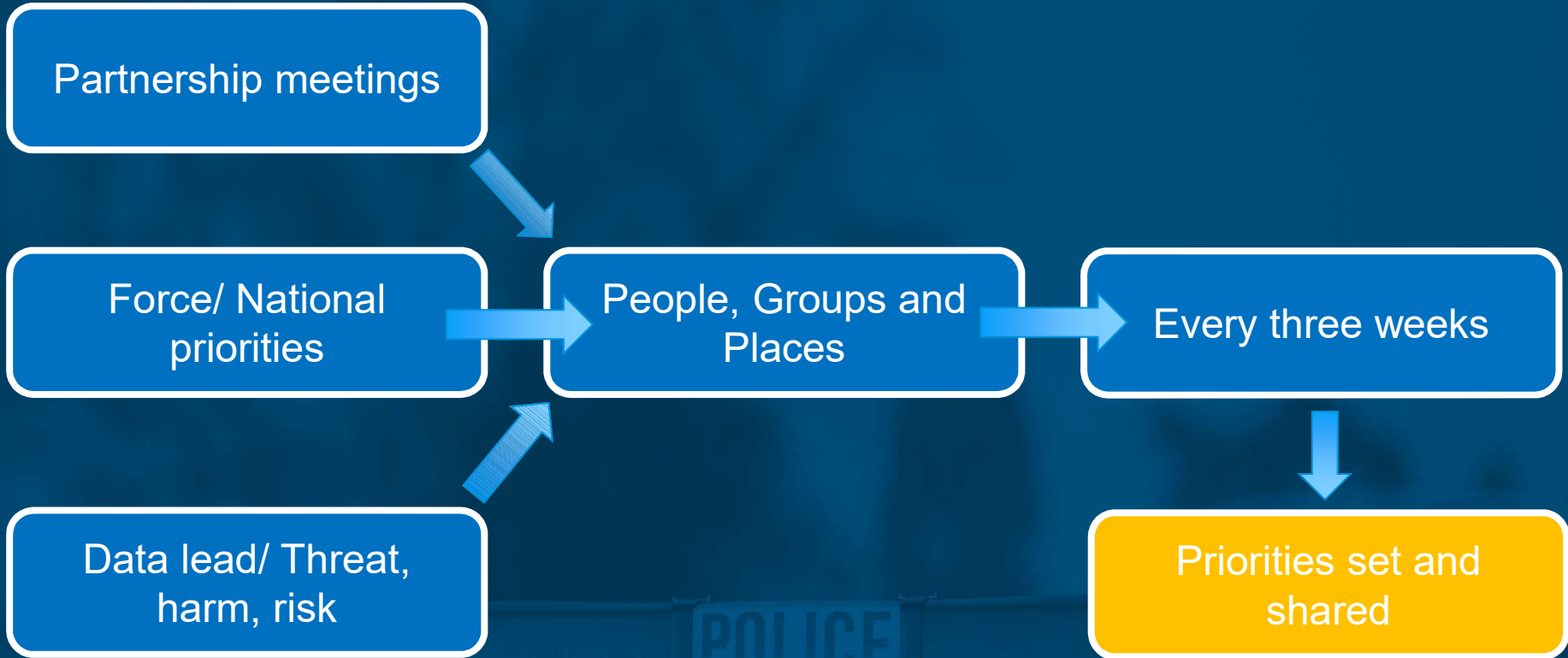

Agreement that Police are dealing with the crime and ASB issues that matter in this area (*% strongly agree/tend to agree*)

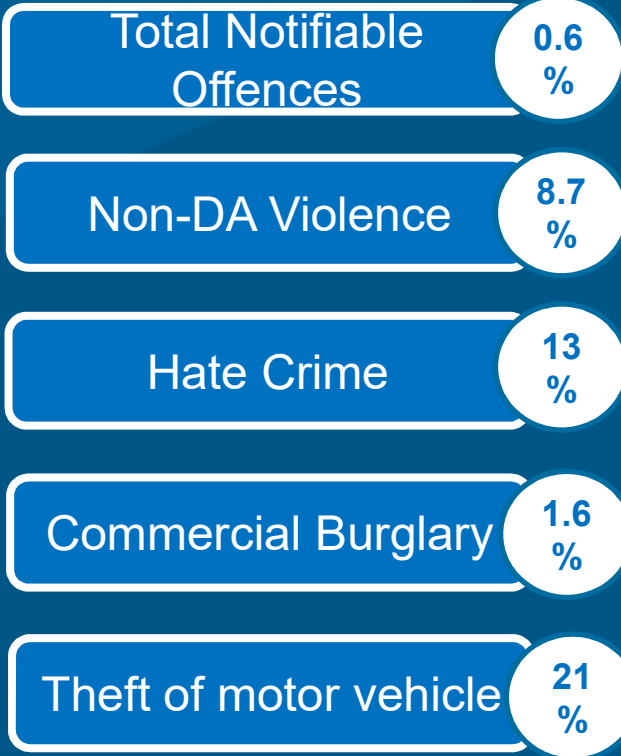

62 offences across Surrey 01/01/22 – 20/05/22

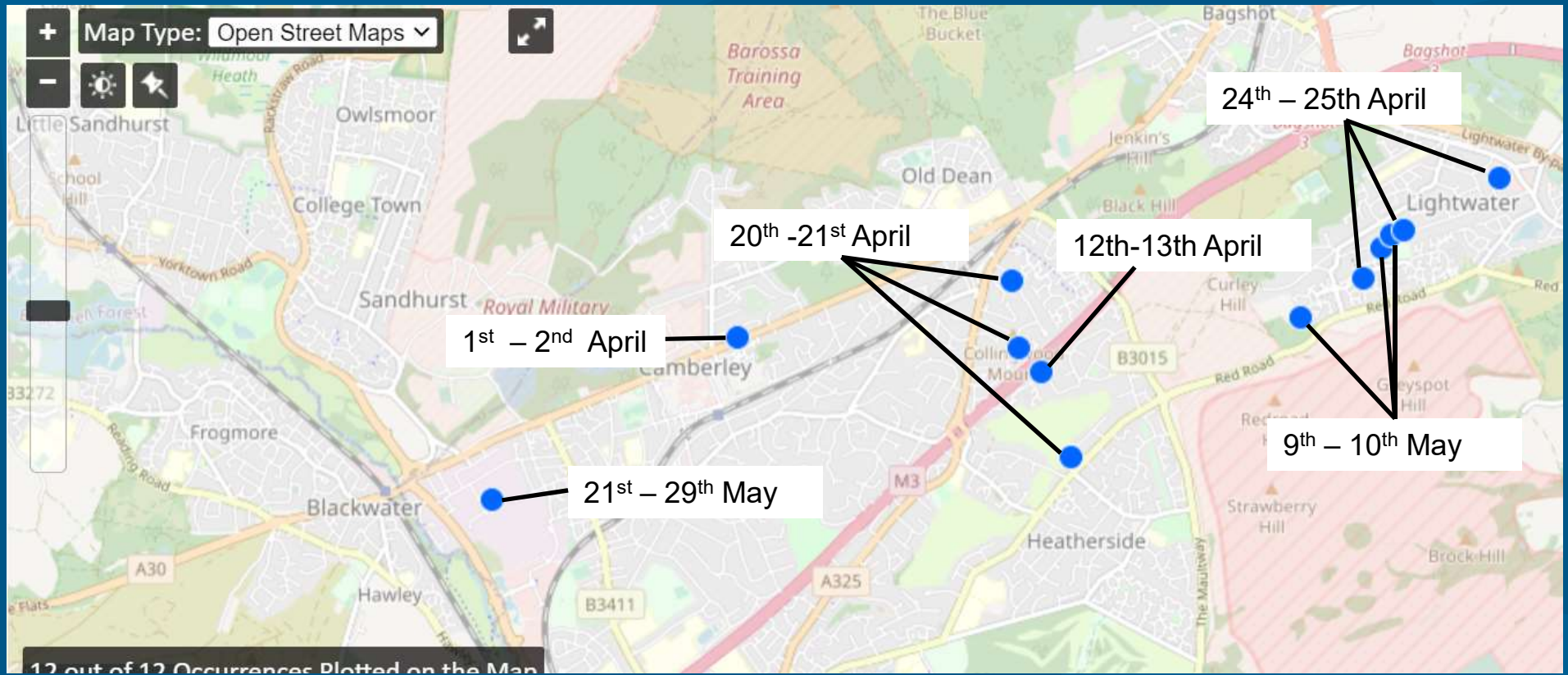
12 of these offences in Surrey Heath

M25 and arterial routes off of it

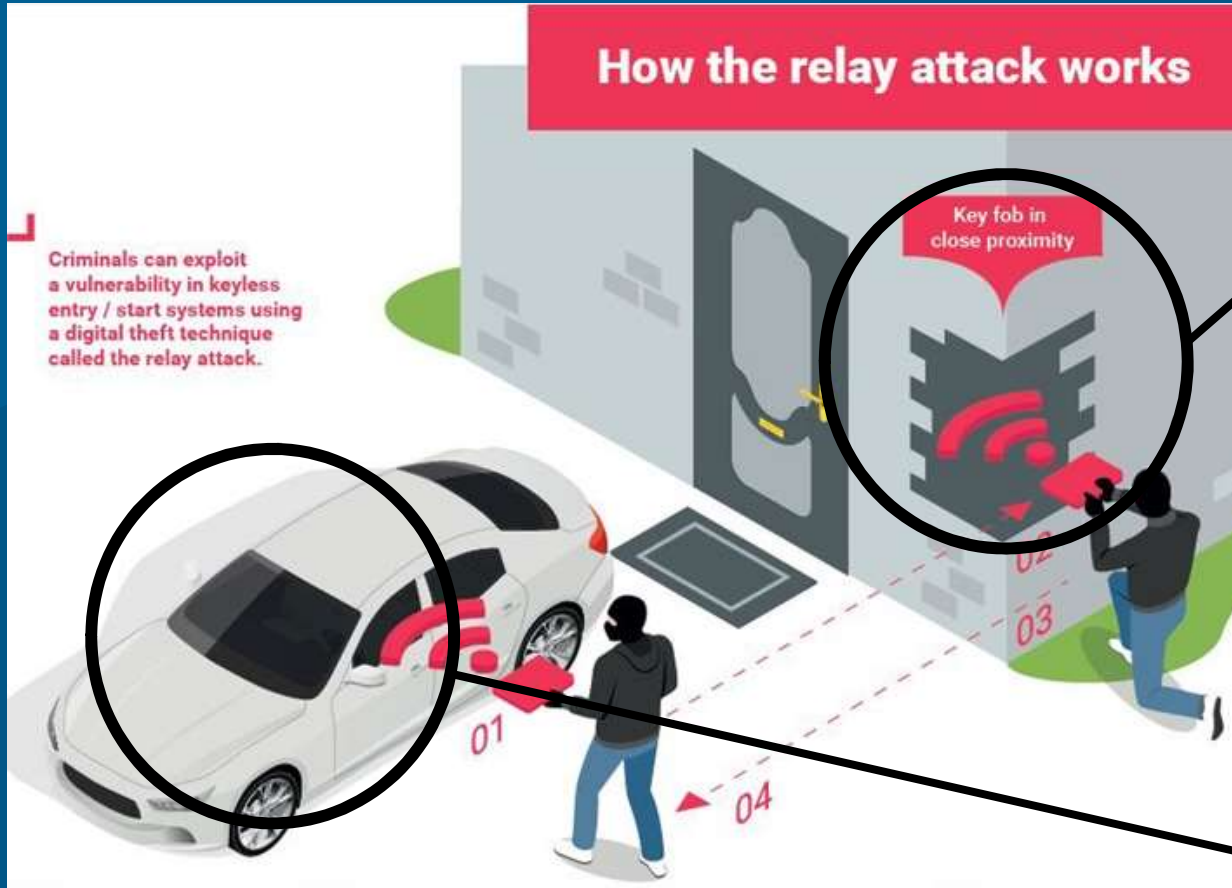
Detection difficulties - Mission vehicles, stolen plates and tracker deactivation

Criminals can exploit a vulnerability in keyless entry / start systems using a digital theft technique called the relay attack.

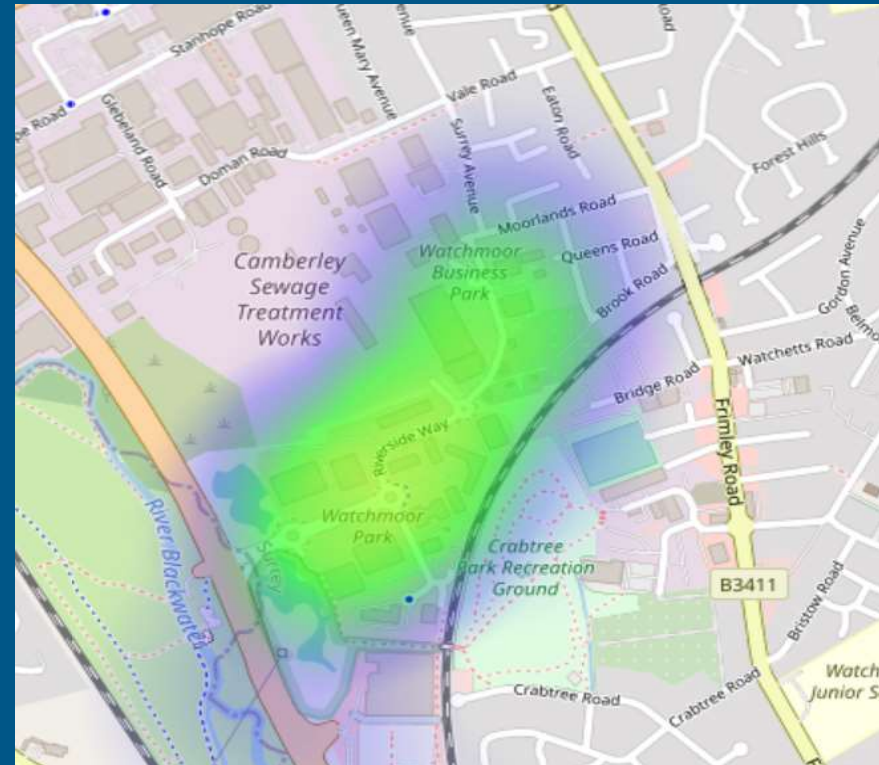

Knife Crime Update

What's it all about?

You have been given this **POLICE NOTICE** as we've been told that you either:

- Might start carrying a knife or...
- Have carried a knife or weapon but haven't been caught by the police... yet

Know what to do

If you feel in danger and think that carrying a knife or weapon will help - tell a trusted adult such as a family member, teacher, youth worker, support worker or a Police officer. We will listen and do what we can to help you.

Know the risks...

- It is a crime if you carry a knife or weapon to protect yourself or to make you feel safe (it doesn't matter if you plan to use it or not)
- You are more likely to be injured or killed if you carry a knife, as your own knife could be used against you or someone else
- You are likely to be arrested if you are carrying a knife or weapon in public or at school
- It is a crime if you have certain weapons or blades at home
- It is a crime if you are under 18 and try to buy a knife
- If you are with a mate who is carrying a knife and you don't do anything to stop it you are (in law) guilty of the same offence as them. This is called "joint enterprise".

Know what might happen...

- Serious injury or death to you or someone else
- Arrest and possible imprisonment
- Criminal record - which may mean you won't get the job you've always wanted, or you can't travel to another country

Take some advice...

DO NOT carry a knife and/or weapon. If you are thinking about it, you are worried about your safety or someone else's safety, or have been threatened then contact Police on 101 or 999 in an emergency. We can then support you and provide personal safety advice to help you feel safe. This ensures communities are safe and prevents YOU from entering the criminal justice system.

Weapons: A guide



Finally... remember - the law is clear

- If you choose to carry a weapon, you put your future in danger. If you don't take it with you, it won't be used.
- If you are caught illegally carrying a knife, gun, or other weapon (even a pretend one) you will be arrested and prosecuted (charged with an offence). It is not an excuse to say it was for your own protection or you were carrying it for someone else.
- It is illegal to carry something with a blade or point or an offensive (dangerous) weapon in a public place

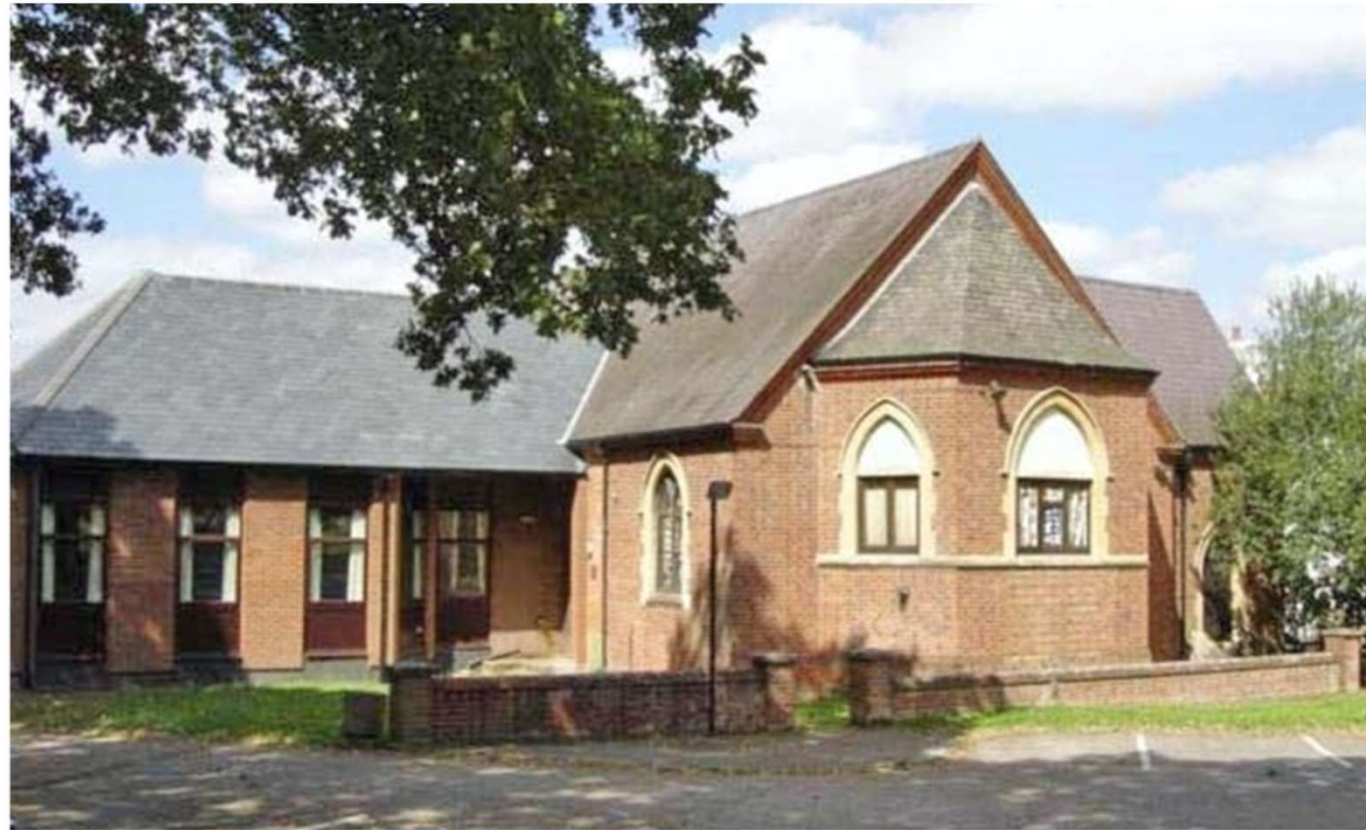

Bisley Village Hall: History

- **Our main hall built as the School chapel part of Shaftesbury School in 1874**
- **The school closed in 1959. The chapel was handed over to the charitable trust in 1961.**
- **Opened as a community facility in 1962.**
- **Jubilee Hall added in 1982**



Bisley Village Hall: Mission and Objectives

“To provide a community facility, in good working order, for the use of as wide a range of local groups as possible”

- We aim to ensure that :
- the Village Hall fulfils the purposes for which it was established
- our buildings and facilities are safe, secure, comfortable, adaptable and attractive for all users and a wide range of uses;
- the charity is solvent.
- our arrangements, policies and approaches safeguard the health and safety and wellbeing of all users.



Bisley Village Hall: Facilities

- **2 Halls: Main and Jubilee**
- **Fully equipped kitchen**
- **Meeting & storage rooms**
- **Stage & lighting and sound**



HEART OF THE COMMUNITY

- Regular users, represented on the Committee: the Womens' Institute; the Residents' Association; a Brass Band and a Children's gymnastics club,
- Over **5000** hours are available for letting each year. **70%+** of this is used.
- Estimated number of users: about **1500-2000** per month.
- 22 users in total including;
 - Community Café
 - Exercise Groups (Yoga, Pilates etc)
 - Various Children's activities
 - Parish Council
 - Craft Groups
 - Quiz nights
 - U3A
 - Parties and celebrations

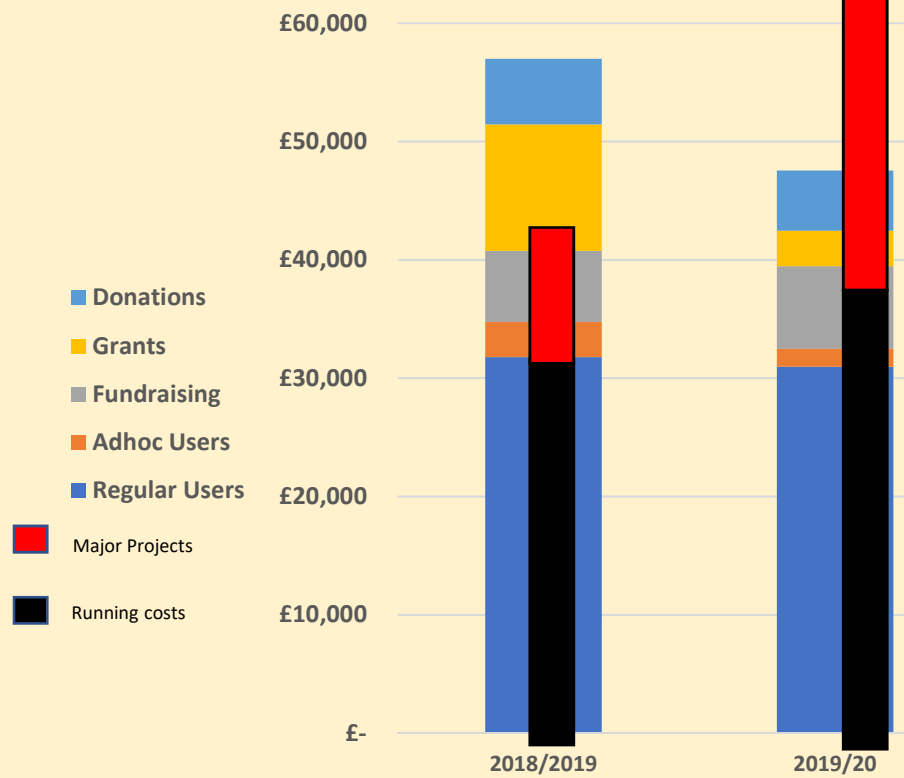

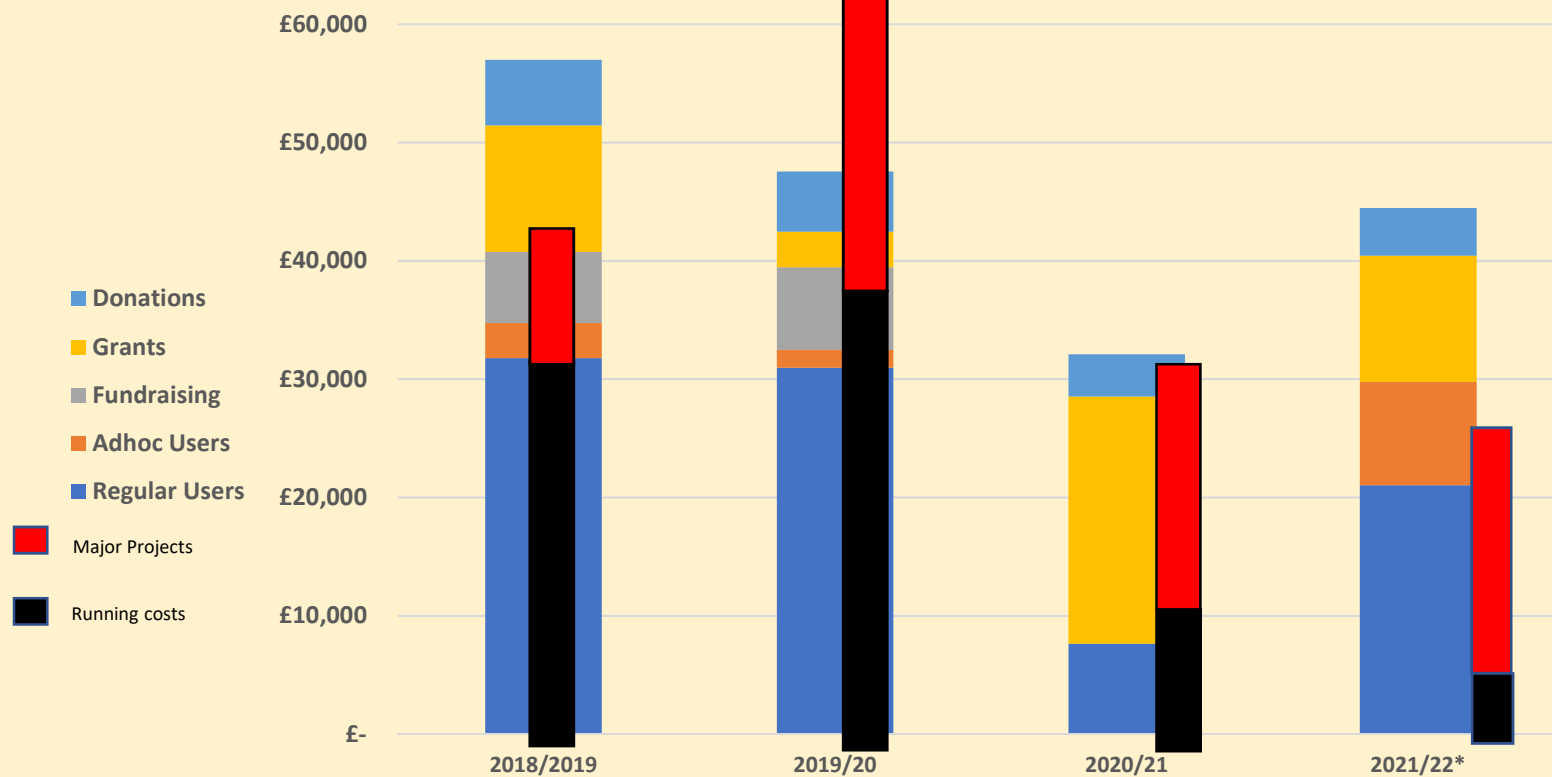

BISLEY VILLAGE HALL: The Covid Years (2)

- **Loss of 2 major users**
- **Several smaller users finished**
- **New users arriving**
- **More Ad- Hoc Bookings**
- **Improved ways of working**
- **Upgrade to web site**



Risks to the Hall

- **An emergency affecting the structure and fabric of the building or it deteriorates leading to prolonged closure/no longer usable**
- **Withdrawal of a major user, lack of sufficient funding, competition from other venues or other reasons; the Hall is under-used and the charity becomes insolvent.**
- **Lack of understanding and cohesion among Trustees, loss of key personnel leading to inability to act proactively, effectively**

A prioritised programme of refurbishment and improvement. Continuous scrutiny; planned annual programme of maintenance; refurbishment programme

Improved communication with users and stakeholders; liaison with community. Seek alternative sources of funding; Improve the attractiveness of the Hall through refurbishment

Strong team; Trustees understand their responsibilities; Trustees are clear about what is happening and what needs to be done. Succession planning, Strong links and training through Surrey Community Action

BISLEY VILLAGE HALL - Looking Forwards The next 5 years

- Refurbishment toilet facilities
- Tackling damp and ventilation
- identify ways of improving the energy efficiency, comfort and attractiveness of the Hall

- Refurbish main Hall floor
- Aspire to restore heritage features of Main Hall
- Recruit new Trustees
